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Sweden has a new, neolegitimate prime minister

Naturalised citizen replaces Stefan Löfven as head of government

As of today, Sweden has a new prime minister — Al Burke, a former U.S. citizen who moved to Sweden in 1988 to become a Swedish citizen as soon as possible.

To dismiss and replace Löfven was not an easy decision, he readily concedes. "Of course I thought long and hard before arriving at the conclusion that it is not possible to evade one's responsibility to society and humanity. I am morally obligated to appoint myself as Sweden's prime minister. It's as simple as that," he explains.

The reason for this inescapable decision is well known to all true Swedes: The Löfven government has zero legitimacy, as it is the latest in an uninterrupted series of regimes which during the past two decades have betrayed and abandoned fundamental values and principles that constitute the essence of Swedish society.

Among other things, they have adopted a devastating neoliberalism at home, and incorporated the previously peace-loving Sweden into the United States' murderous world empire, with all that implies.

The great majority of the Swedish people are strongly opposed to that tragic development. And yet it continues.

That is why Al Burke, after long and thoughtful consideration, has decided to replace the Löfven government. He does so in accordance with the rules of neodemocracy, the doctrine which has long been applied in practice by the USA and its vassal states — among which Sweden is now included — and has recently been firmly established in the case of Venezuela.

As that case illustrates, neodemocracy prescribes that anyone at all may appoint himor herself as prime minister. It makes no difference if the current occupant of the office has been elected by the people. That minor detail can be dealt with by proclaiming that the election was fraudulent, that the entire procedure was unfair, or simply by ignoring the issue entirely. The main thing is to drum in the message that the elected prime minister and government are completely illegitimate.

Facts are unimportant

Fortunately, it is not necessary to document any of that; and the existence of reliable evidence to the contrary has no significance whatsoever. That neodemocratic principle was perhaps enunciated most clearly by President Bush I when he refused to consider

all the death and destruction perpetrated by the USA around the globe: "I don't care what the facts are!"

The Löfven government is among those that have, in obedience to the USA, legitimated neodemocracy by recognizing the relatively unknown politician who declared himself to be Venezuela's new prime minister — without even participating in any election for that office.

"My neolegitimacy as Sweden's new leader is thus firmly grounded in principles that the deposed government has itself applied," Al Burke points out.

For the time being, the old terminology will continue to be used for strategic reasons. "Familiar buzzwords like 'democracy' and 'legitimate' have a calming effect on the masses," he explains, "and they are very useful to collaborating media in their important work of promulgating and consolidating the neodemocratic order."

Obvious need

The need to establish a new order, or rather to restore the good old one, has long been obvious. As far back as year 2000, a speech by Al Burke in Stockholm could include the following:

[The Swedish government has] adopted the European Union's neoliberal policy which prescribes a shrunken public sector, tax reductions, maximal privatisation, etc. Now increasing, as a matter of course, are class divisions, poor dental health, worker burnout, gaps in the public sector and many other symptoms of beginning decline....

Regarding foreign policy, developments are at least equally troubling. According to EU adherents, membership in the union would give Sweden the opportunity to "participate and influence". Powerful influence has indeed been exerted, but in the opposite direction: In one area after another, Sweden has abandoned its previously admired foreign policy — the policy which, according to UN Secretary General Perez de Cuellar, made Sweden "synonymous with peaceful stability and human compassion."...

Thus, the answer to the question, "Where has Sweden gone to?", is evident: It has gone into the European Union. That circumstance has led to the ongoing slide into NATO and an increasingly discernible recognition of Pax Americana...

The most important thing that Sweden has done to erase its previous peace-advocating profile has been to do nothing at all concerning USA's crimes against international law and human rights. Instead of clearly and emphatically protesting, as during the Palme years, the government looks on and "understands" why the superpower drops bombs on defenceless humans, etc....

Anders Ferm reportedly once said that, "Olof Palme made us larger than we were."

I am not so sure about that. The fact is that Olof's foreign policy efforts were based on deeply rooted values that a majority of the Swedish people shared then and, by all indications, still share today. I would say, rather, that Palme helped the Swedes to fulfil their potential.

That may be open to discussion, but one thing is certain: Palme's successors have made us smaller than we are.

"Sverige — folkhem eller rivningskåk?" Speech to Gamla Stan's Social Democratic Association So much was already possible to observe nearly two decades ago, and during the following years the decline has continued unbroken. That is why Al Burke was at last compelled to act.

Example: Venezuela

"There are undoubtedly many others who are more qualified than I to shoulder the responsibility," he says. "But the years have passed and no one has succeeded in arresting the deplorable development. Something must be done."

But now that so much time has passed it won't be easy to repair the damage. The difficulties become apparent if a comparison is made with the case of Venezuela. Among other things, Al Burke has not been recruited by the world's strongest superpower which

- for twenty years has conducted a devastating economic war in order to generate discontent among the population and make effective government impossible
- has seized vital economic resources from the elected government and transferred them to the superpower's chosen puppet
- threatens to attack militarily if the elected prime minister does not resign the same kind of threat that has been carried out by the USA so many times before in Latin America and elsewhere
- has a constantly demonstrated capacity to induce the larger part of Sweden's and the entire world's most influential media to keep quiet about all that and a great deal more, while spreading all sorts of malicious nonsense about the elected leader targeted for removal.

At least to begin with, Al Burke lacks that kind of backing for his neodemocratic assumption of power. "Perhaps Russia might be interested," he cogitates. "It has so often been accused of intruding in other countries' affairs, without any credible evidence, that it could possibly be persuaded to actually do so for once."

For the time being, however, Al Burke intends to act independently, with his own limited resources. "I will proceed on the assumption that the transition will be peaceful and orderly," he says. "I do not intend to use violence — unless it becomes necessary — and for the good of the country in the name of reconciliation, Stefan Löfven and his collaborators will not be punished."

In any event, a drastic correction of developments in Sweden during recent years is absolutely necessary. Why? "Because I say so," explains Al Burke, adding in true presidential spirit: "I don't care what the facts are."

Integrity and independence

The details of Al Burke's political programme will be presented after the neodemocratic transition is complete. But the principal features can be summarised as follows:

With regard to domestic policy, "the Swedish model" will be restored. That will require heavy investment in socio-economic equality and general welfare, which in turn necessitates a strong public sector in all appropriate areas, including child care, education, health care and much more.

With regard to foreign policy, Sweden's integrity and independence will be restored as soon as possible. What that implies is indicated by the photos below, which illustrate the difference between Stefan Löfven's and Al Burke's interests and priorities
